As 2020 ends, we find ourselves reflecting on the year. While it has been a year full of challenges and hardships, we are proud of and inspired by the efforts pushed forward by the Walnut Creek wetland partners.

After community engagement, one of two concept designs was selected for the Bailey Drive Gateway site, "A Walk in the Neighborhood."



COVID-19 hit, and the community was called upon to practice social distancing—but our parks and greenways offered a safe outdoor space.



Partners completed a watershed plan for the Rochester Heights Creek, and were awarded a grant to install a series of stormwater control measures in Biltmore Hills Park—the effort will start in January 2021.



Engagement efforts pivoted this year. Instead of public gatherings, outreach included 50 direct mailings with locally-made masks, phone interviews, and flyers in produce boxes to 20 homes.



PEJ hired Tatiana Height as Program Director, she is coordinating the upcoming Raleigh Watershed Learning Network, and other future programming.



In spring and fall, two different American Conservation Experience crews, including local young adults, did vegetation management at the Wetland Park.




A Busy Winter Around the Wetlands

Locals Improve the Wetland Park

Local young adults joined an American Conservation Experience (ACE) crew to do vegetation management at the wetland park. StepUp Ministry offered a professional development training, and PEJ and WRRRI did an environmental justice and watershed science training. For the past four weeks, members removed invasive plants and planted native pollinator and wetland plants. Habitat restoration is a slow process, but this group of enthusiastic, positive, and determined young adults have made impressive progress on improving the wetland.

Learning Around the Wetlands

The Norman and Betty Camp Education Center is partnering with SE Raleigh YMCA's afterschool program to engage 4th and 5th grade students on pollinators. The program will focus on stormwater and water quality, and will design and plant a pollinator garden on the backside of the YMCA.

The Walnut Creek Wetland Park is at 100% design completion for the master plan design. Included are various paths, teaching platforms and boardwalks. The plan will go before the parks board by the end of the year.

The nature playscape is now in the design process.
