Exciting Updates From Partners For Environmental Justice

PEJ helped kick off the new Walnut Creek Stakeholder Group, formed as a rezoning condition for the <u>Downtown South</u> project thanks to PEJ & partners' negotiating for stormwater management above requirements. The Group is a coalition of residents, nonprofits, faith-based organizations, NC State and businesses, and will oversee a watershed improvement fund provided by the developers.

PEJ coordinated a full day training event in July, *Environmental Justice and Water* for American Conservation Experience interns who worked at the Wetland Park this summer.

A PEJ Board member and Walnut Creek Watershed Learning Network recently attended the One Water Summit in Milwaukee, WI by invitation.

Construction Updates: The two projects on the north side of the park are nearly complete: An accessible trail with a bridge connecting to the Walnut Creek Greenway and a teaching platform a little further down the greenway. The southside trail project has run into some stormwater drainage issues and is going to take a little longer

4th Annual Mud Day

Mud Day was a great success, and the Park staff estimated that we served 400-500 children and their families. A good, very messy, time was had by all! WCWCP's Stewardship Crew invited Mud Day participants to "vote" with dots on activities they would like to do at the park. The top 4 activities children and adults both wanted to

do (in order) are:

1. Meet & learn about wildlife

- 2. Paint or draw outdoors
- 3. Plan or care for a garden event
- Explore streams with an expert



Conservation workforce training

American Conservation Experience, (ACE) hosted a 5-week workforce training program focused on improving the Walnut Creek Wetlands! PEJ, WRRI, NC State, and StepUp ministry trained the 5 member crew in water and environmental justice issues and solutions in SE Raleigh, and career skills. The crew receive training in managing vegetation, including removing non-native invasive plants, and planting native plant species, and applied what they learned at the Walnut Creek Wetlands Park. Funding for the project came from The Conservation Fund through a Duke Energy Foundation grant. Visit American Conservation Experience to learn about their other conservation opportunities!



Bailey Drive Gateway

The Bailey Drive Gateway project is still moving along. The Conservation Fund is continuing to work with Design Workshop on design development and review, and outreach this Fall for additional oral histories for a permanent art installation of legacy residents in the final design. This summer a local crew worked with American Conservation Experience (ACE) to remove invasive species and learn about the history of Walnut Creek and communities in Southeast Raleigh.
